



# ANIMAL COMMUNICATION IN 3 EASY STEPS

Now let's imagine a world where you're able to check in with your pet and tell them that you're going to be home late, that tomorrow is a Sunday and you want a 'sleep in' or that you you'll take them to the park in thirty minutes. This is where we step into the world of Animal Communication, being able to connect and talk with your pet anytime, anyplace.

Many people use the skills of Animal Communicator to get a deeper understanding of their pet, to know what they think about their family and if there is anything more that they would like. Other times, it's helping them understand the changes in the home that effect their lives for example:

- **MOVING HOME** – this is a stressful time for any humans involved let alone the animals in the household
- **GOING ON HOLIDAYS** – letting them know if they're going on their own 'special' holiday or if they have a visitor coming to stay with them
- **AN ADDITION OR CHANGE TO THE FAMILY** – preparing them for a change in family dynamics or pack order can alleviate so much stress for everyone involved by giving them the heads up
